No fires along Lake Roosevelt

Lake Roosevelt National Recreation Area except in park-provided fire grates at developed campgrounds and propane cookstoves and lanterns.

Superintendent Dan Foster established the fire closure last week. The closure includes all park managed lands and exposed lakebed.

Fires banned on state-protected lands

The state Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Thursday banned fires on DNR-protected lands in eastern Washington effective July 2.

The ban applies to all outdoor burning on state forests, state parks and forestlands under DNR fire protection east of the crest of the Cascade Mountains.

It does not include federally owned lands. Counties and local fire districts may have additional burn restrictions.

"Given the enormity of the last two fire seasons, it's appropriate to be cautious," said Commissioner of Public Lands Peter Goldmark. "This burn ban will help protect people, forests and property."

The last two wildfire seasons have been the state's worst ever. In 2014, the Carlton Complex fire burned more than 250,000 acres, the largest wildfire in state history. In 2015, more than a million acres burned across the state, the single worst wildfire year ever in Washington history.

In 2016 so far, there have been 234 wildfire starts throughout the state, 202 of them caused by humans.

The ban is in effect through September.

Land for parks, pathway to be discussed in public meeting

A second Electric City Pathways and Parks meeting has been scheduled for Saturday, July 16, in the park-like grassy area behind city hall, where residents can see how well the city's Pathways and Parks Revitalization plan is coming along.

Ice cream will be provided by MJs Bistro. The futuristic plan has been shaped by a Washington State University team from the school's Rural Communities Design Initiative, after an earlier public meeting in May. A local committee, appointed by the city council, has reviewed some of the plans from the WSU

group and asked that they focus on the proposed trail system with the emphasis on the Ice Age Floods.

The local committee decided to focus on a beach trail. The group also asked that the plan include

sidewalks and bike trails through the commercial district and that in two park areas the new park behind the fire station and the park by the arsenic treatment plant — that restrooms be established.

The idea of a barbecue pit area with a partition wall was discussed for the Fire Station Park as well as the planting of trees to cut the rays of the afternoon sun.

At the park by the arsenic treatment plant, the design calls for a near full-size outdoor basketball court. The city and the WSU team, made up of professors and students, will present a more complete proposed plan at the July 16 meeting, which will begin at 1 p.m.

Local Pathways and Revitalization Committee members present at their last meeting were Lonna Bussert, Brad Parrish, Cynthia Greely, Clark Perman, Carol Nordine and city Administrator Russ Powers.

The city council has proposed that some \$400,000 of its hotel/motel tax money be held in reserve to go towards the project, plus another \$40,000 for the planning phase.

Suit: Grand Coulee Dam pollutes river

An environmental group has sued the Bureau of Reclamation to force compliance with the Clean Water Act, which it contends Grand Coulee Dam and other big dams are not meeting.

Pollution discharges from the USBR's operation of the dam "contribute to the pollution crisis on the Columbia River," the suit brought Thursday by Columbia Riverkeeper says.

The group wants Reclamation to switch to using so called ecofriendly oils and greases as lubricants in machinery that contacts water and file for a pollution permit under the Clean Water Act.

In 2014, the group settled a similar suit with the Army Corps of Engineers, which operates seven large dams on the Snake and Columbia rivers.

The Corps is currently testing the use of vegetable-based oils for lubricants. If those tests are successful Reclamation could likely use those results and make that switch, too, said Lauren Goldberg, who filed the suit June 29 in the U.S. District Court in Eastern Washington. See SUIT page 2

Bill bickering brings in lawyers

Grand Coulee and Electric City continue their disagreement over a \$39,000 arsenic treatment dispute.

Grand Coulee Mayor Paul Townsend proposed to his council that maybe it would be a good thing to meet Electric City halfway on the disputed \$39,000. His suggestion got nowhere at the last council meeting.

In fact, it prompted Councilmember Erin Nielson to move to stand firm on the city's contention that it doesn't owe Electric City the \$39,000. His motion passed unanimously.

Accordingly, Townsend sent Electric City the bad news by let-

The disagreement over the amount stems from exactly when the two cities signed a new agree-

ment over how the arsenic removal charges were to be made. That agreement was made the two councils in September, 2014, and signed by both mayors.

Electric City has charged that Grand Coulee should pay the arsenic treatment expenses under its old agreement until the new agreement was signed. Grand Coulee maintains that it only owes service charges from the time the new agreement was

Both cities have "lawyered up," and each has spent about \$2,000 in legal fees so far, according to

the two city clerks. Electric City Clerk Jackie Perman said that her council hasn't had time to decide what to do next, but will likely address it at the council's next meeting, July 12, beginning at 6 p.m.

The Grand Coulee council's next meeting is July 19.

Holiday weekend had its problems

It wasn't the smoothest sailing for festival planners over this Independence Day weekend.

Problems started with short notice from Grant County Health District authorities that a water park for kids couldn't happen the way it was planned.

Smaller complications, such as reportedly rude political protesters and a lost chid (she was found) were wedged between that

announcement and the final blow - a power outage that cancelled the Laser Light Show during the biggest festival of the year.

Officials in Coulee Dam, which operates the electric utility supplying the power to the Bureau of Reclamation's Visitor Center at Grand Coulee Dam, believe the cause was a tree that fell at the end of Stevens Ave. at dusk.

That happens to be where Councilmember Gayle Swagerty lives. She was outside her home

New interpretations of old regulations forced a last-minute change to plans for a water park, a new feature of the chamber of commerce's Festival of America.

The Grand Coulee Dam Area Chamber of Commerce put on the festival and an associated feature for kids planned to be mostly water features, but it was less so

than planned. The change followed an 11th-

Water park was less wet

hour phone call from a Gant County Health District official who said the district wouldn't allow the features that had been

The district is enforcing state rules written decades ago to address constructing public water features such as big water slides. They are applying them now to an emerging area of concern for public health officials: inflatables and other less permanent water

A process imposed for permits takes weeks, but the health district just learned of the chamber's plans last week. That process requires submission of architectural drawings and design speci-

After discussions with vendor Jump-N-2-Fun, altered features were OK'd, but not the biggest and best slides, which would have pooled water at the bottom. The vendor changed his plans, unpacked and reloaded his truck

with other equipment. Toys once intended for backyard use have now grown to an industrial design and are being used commercially. Public health officials are concerned about the possible spread of waterborne disease in water shared by many people, even though there is no record of it actually occurring in

City may increase water rates

Grand Coulee residents may soon face a water rate increase.

City Clerk Carol Boyce said last week that she will propose to the council July 19, that the city increase its water rates by \$3 a month, beginning in September.

The increase would help the city replenish its water reserve account, which was depleted during several water service repairs back in 2014.

That year, the city made major water delivery improvements near Jess Ford, city hall and East Heights.

"We paid for those improvements out of our reserves," Boyce stated. Those improvements cost the city about \$400,000, about half of Grand Coulee's water reserve account.

Boyce said if the council approves the \$3-a-month increase it would raise about \$1,600 more a month for the city. At that rate it would take more than 20 years to

build up \$400,000.

The city council has had the issue of water rates on the table for the past two sessions. An ordinance presented called for a 2-percent increase, but the council indicated that it wasn't enough.

The city will likely continue whatever rate increase it passes at its next meeting for three years or so and then incrementally make another increase.

West Nile present in county

Grant County Mosquito Control District 1 has reported a mosquito sample collected west of Moses Lake has tested positive for West Nile virus, making it the first detection of the virus in the county this season.

Mosquito District 1 covers the Greater Moses Lake area, including the Moses Lake Sand Dunes and Potholes areas.

The positive sample is an indication that WNV is present in this area and potentially other areas of Grant County.

During the 2015 season, four humans, seven horses and 107 mosquito samples were found to

be infected with WNV, making it the most active season since WNV was found in the area nearly a decade before.

There are no reports of human or other animal cases so far this year, officials noted.

"The presence of WNV in local mosquitoes is a sign that our residents and guests can be infected, therefore we all need to take steps to prevent mosquito bites," said Amber McCoy, environmental health specialist of the Grant County Health District.

The risk is low, but anyone can be infected. People over 50 years old have the highest risk of serious illness. Most people who are infected with WNV will not get

sick. About one in five people infected will have mild symptoms, such as fever, headache and body aches. Even fewer, about one in 150 people infected, will have more severe symptoms, health officials stated.

Some tips on how to avoid mosquitoes include staying indoors at dawn and dusk when they are most active; wear long sleeve shirts, long pants, and a hat when going into mosquito areas; use a repellent; make sure that windows are bug tight; eliminate mosquito breeding areas around your property; and make sure that water in bird feeders is changed frequently.

The complaint seeks to force the Bureau to keep open records on its pollution activities, which Riverkeepers contends it does not, citing documents it says it doesn't believe represent the extent of the pollution.

The bureau files reports with the U.S. Coast Guard indicating oil spills from time to time. Last June it reported two gallons of lubricant entered the river in separate incidents due to equipment failure, for example, another 10 gallons in 2014 when a fitting leaked on a lift gate. In all, Coast Guard reports cited in the suit record 42.25 gallons of oil spilled since September 2011.

"This lawsuit will end unchecked oil pollution from Grand Coulee Dam," stated Brett VandenHeuvel, executive director of Columbia Riverkeeper in a press release. "For the first time in its long history, Grand Coulee Dam must reduce toxic pollution, switch to eco-friendly oils, and disclose oil discharges to the public, if we are successful."

Bringers of the suit see it as "the next phase in the work to protect clean water and eliminate

toxic pollution from dams." Goldberg said an application to pollute the river under the Clean Water Act, which the Bureau has not made, would also require it to reduce pollution in order to acquire the permit. It would also have to be more open about pollutants it admits to the river, she

when she heard the crack of breaking limbs, saw a bright flash of light and loud boom when the lights went out all over town.

In daylight the next day, the town's crew foreman, Mike Steffens, agreed it appeared the big locust tree had fallen across Fiddle Creek, struck the three main lines on the pole and caused the outage, which lasted past the onset of darkness.

The park below the Visitor Center was full of people sitting in darkness expecting the laser show to start. Instead the fireworks that had been scheduled for after the lasers took their place in the lineup, prompting complaints from people who had travelled to see both.

A locust tree lies across Fiddle Creek at near the foot bridge entrance to Cole Park at the end of Stevens Ave. in Coulee Dam, where it fell on July 4, causing a power outage and cancelling the Laser Light Show for a town full of visitors. In the presidential campaign leading up to the higher quality if U.S. Made.' November elections, hopefully we will hear about ways to "Make America Great Again!"

One of the most effective strategies is to entice U.S. companies with foreign factories to relocate back home. Another is to encourage those who remained in America to reinvest here.

Discussions about bolstering domestic production of goods and services did not start this year. They are largely rooted in our nation's anemic job creation over the last decade.

A "Reshoring Institute" launched in 2014 at the University of San Diego (USD) is providing research and support for companies trying to bring manufacturing and services back to America. It includes site comparisons, taxes and incentives, regulations and permitting, science

and math education, and cost comparison for developing, manufacturing and marketing.

The encouraging news is The Boston Consulting Group determined 54 percent of companies with over \$1 billion in revenue are considering bringing at least part of their production back to the United

One of the leaders in this effort is Walmart, which launched its "Investing in American Jobs' campaign three years ago.

Walmart is the world's largest company by revenue, according to Fortune Global 500 list (2014). The company committed to purchasing an additional \$250 billion in "products made, sourced or grown in the U.S. by 2023" and aims to create up to 1 million new American jobs.

That's a big deal considering Walmart has 11,500 stores in 28 countries and 2.2 million employees which can sell our home made items.

Walmart's research found that "Made in USA" is a powerful magnet in our purchasing decisions - second only to price. The findings only underscore our need to keep production costs on par or below our internationally competition.

There are two things which standout: "85 percent of moms said it is important for a retailer to sell "Made in the USA" products; and, in general, products across all categories are perceived to have

Washington is a national leader in on-shore production. Now the key is to keep those companies investing, developing and creating jobs in Washington instead of South Carolina or Shanghai.

Boeing is the global aerospace front-runner. Well over half of airliners flying passengers today

were assembled in the Puget Sound region. Microsoft is the international leader in computer operating software and markets its "word products" in languages spoken around the world.

Schweitzer Engineering Labs (SEL), a Pullmanbased manufacturer, makes the world's most advanced electronic devices to prevent widespread electrical blackouts. Nelson Irrigation, Wal-

la Walla, thrives in highly competitive worldwide markets for agricultural irrigation sprinkler systems. Both are home grown companies which have invested heavily in Washington.

Foreign corporations spent billions building production facilities in our state largely because of our low cost, reliable electricity. Some of that reliable power comes from nuclear, coal and natural gasfired generation, and they need lots of electricity.

In Moses Lake, REC Silicon ASA, a Norwegian company, sited its most advanced complex to produce solar-grade silicon, and Germany's BMW built its carbon-fiber production plant for its new electric

Semiconductors manufacturers, many based in Asia, located plants along our I-5 corridor and spend billions to upgrade production facilities around the world. Semiconductors, the devices which make our computers and everyday products work.

"Making America Great Again" must be more than a political slogan. It has to be a national initiative by all Americans, regardless of political party. Much of our success hinges upon keeping our costs of production competitive.

As Walmart research unveiled, "Made in USA" is a strong magnet in our purchase decisions — second only to price.


I also got a chance to go to Turnbull Wildlife Refuge over the weekend and take some pictures. What a gorgeous place. It is near Cheney, and I highly rec-


As we drove home Monday night we got to experience each towns little firework show. From the seats in our car, moving down the asphalt trail we saw bits of American tradition and pride sparkling in the




